Thoughts for the month



As I'm writing this letter I'm sat looking out of the window at a sunny morning after much, much rain these last few weeks, and it seems finally that we're enjoying the signs of spring. There is a little warmth in the sun, the birds are singing, the leaves on the trees are beginning to unfold into their glory and the snow drops are giving way to daffodils.

As you start to get into this magazine Spring will be well under way; I imagine trees to be in full leaf, more flowers beginning to bloom and maybe you're already planning a BBQ. (In saying that realise I could have put the kibosh on the warm sunshine - many apologies if that's the case!). Spring is a time when we literally see night turn into day, and we have just turned the clocks forward brightening our evenings. My own story of faith is how even in the darkest nights I have been able to see the light and love of Christ, place my hand into his and walk forward together.

Gardening



Let's go native.

So there was this clump of primroses growing alongside and amongst a patch of dandelions, nearby was some garden mint, all was well in the garden, the dandelions started to get big ideas and tried to encourage the primroses to back them up in an attempt to gain some ground from the mint, the primroses flatly refused, saying "we're not going near him, he's menthol". Okay, back in the room now, I have been asked to design a wildlife friendly garden containing some species native to the UK and incorporating a small wildflower meadow. I thought I would take the opportunity to share some of my research in case anyone out there wants to try it for themselves.

The first thing to consider is the soil and light, some wildflowers are suited to particular soils, generally they tend to thrive on poor soil with good drainage, although there are some that like boggy ground. The area I am dealing with has light free draining soil and is in partial shade at some parts of the day, otherwise the area has good light. The garden is surrounded by a high brick wall which restricts the light to a degree and often the base of a wall is generally quite dry, all things to consider when planting.

The garden is divided into four areas which will all link together with the planting

following a wildlife theme throughout, not all the plants will be native as this is quite restrictive in choice but there are a host of cultivated plants that are great for attracting wildlife and fit into the theme.

I have opted for four small to medium sized trees that will bear fruit for the birds (and the client), a Victoria plum (prunus domestica 'Victoria') a crab apple (malus sylvestris 'golden hornet') a bird cherry (prunus avium 'Sweetheart') (these are self-fertile so they will always produce fruit) and a rowan (sorbus aucuparia), this one will be in the wildflower meadow. There will be hedging to perimeter of the garden which will be a mixture of native trees, such as hawthorn (crataegus monogyna) blackthorn or sloe (prunus spinosa) field maple (acer campestre) holly (*llex*) and hazel (corylus avellana). There will also be areas incorporating shrubs, for this I have chosen a number of different types that should give some benefits at different times of year, these include (cotoneaster horizontalis) which, contrary to its name will clothe a brick wall as it grows vertically supporting itself, an evergreen that in the late Summer/early Autumn will have a mass of red berries that the birds love, it can also be included in a hedge. Flowering currant (ribes sanguineum); forsythia; barberry (berberis thundbergia) is also good for hedging, along with; sweet box (sarcococca humilis); skimmia japonica; and the cape fuschia (phygelius).Cont'd /

To pad out the borders and add yet more diversity and interest I will include some perennials, Hellebores are a must, as are perennial Geraniums, try to remember to go for single open flowers, these are more easily accessible for bees and other insects to get into and pollinate, *aquillegias, penstemmons, asrantia major, erigeron karvenskianus,* asters, foxgloves (*digitalis*) *dierama pulcherrimum,* primroses (*primula vulgaris*) cone flower (*echinacea*) teasel (*dipsacus*) and a favourite of mine, iris *setosa*. At some point I will include a selection of bulbs, corms, and tubers as they come into season.

The list is endless but with a little research and talking to the staff at the garden centre, getting the right plants for your garden is relatively simple. I want to just cover the wildflower meadow before I run out of space. Creating a meadow can be done using a seed mixture from the garden centre or online, look for the mix that works well in the area that you live. Prepare the ground by digging it over and clearing as many weeds as possible and raking to fine tilth, there is no need for compost or feed as wildflowers prefer poor soil. Sow in April by scattering the seed across the area and water it in, then wait for the magic. Weed out things like nettles and bindweed as you see them to reduce the competition for the flowers. I have opted for wildflower turf as I need to create an instant garden, it is much more expensive but guarantees successful establishment, the ground is prepared the same but I will be incorporating purpose made wild flower compost before laying the turf, I will also scatter a variety of bulbs under the turf, these will naturalise and the dying leaves will be hidden by the wildflowers and grasses. In September after the flowers have dropped their seeds the

area needs to be strimmed (or scythed) down to a height of 6" (150mm) collect up the cuttings and compost them, a light mowing without collecting the cuttings again in March will keep it tidy ready for the next season.



Brew & Chat: a very welcome break. On a Wednesday afternoon about 1.45pm, doors around the village open and residents emerge. They will be wrapped up against the cold and can be seen moving as swiftly as possible in the direction of St Andrew's Church for what many think of as the 'highlight of their week'.

For the past sixteen years, almost every Wednesday from 2.00 until 4.00pm the church family have offered a cup of hot tea or filter coffee, a biscuit, and a chat to anyone who wanted to join in. Brick Meadows

We would like to thank the many people who supported us in our aim to get the two meadows, which run parallel to Coggeshall road, included in the Neighbourhood Plan. We are pleased to say that we have had confirmation from the Parish Council that the area will now be appear in the "green spaces" section instead of just being assigned to an appendix within the document. This is a very welcome step forward.

Having studied a map of the area from 1590 we have noted that these two fields were known as "Ryefields", and they will be known as such from now on. We are still continuing with our quest to extend Nature Reserve status to include "Ryefields", but it seems to be a very low priority by Braintree District Council, so our next step is to apply to Essex County Council for help. Nature reserve status will hopefully give an upper level of protection from development.

In partnership with the Four Colnes Horticultural Society we hope to create an area of wildflower meadow in the lower part of Ryefields, using the remaining money collected in memory of Andrew Crane to fund this project. The first step will be to cut the field in the Spring when we have some dry weather, then another cut in June/July, followed by spreading the area with wildflower hay from a nearby source to encourage seeding the ground. We are also very grateful to Oliver Wass for his assistance in this project.

Brick Meadows

The working party that meets monthly on the third Thursday of the month continues to play a big part in maintaining the area. Last month's task was to replace a rotting wooden gate at the bottom of The Park Lane Chase with a metal one taken from another part of the site. We also aim to replace the wooden kissing gate nearby with a metal one. We are thankful to Councillor Chris Siddall for allocating some grant money towards the purchase of a Brush Cutter. This will be used to keep the paths cut in the summer and will be vital in cutting the Anthills field where a tractor and mower cannot be used.

A wet and soggy winter has led to the paths within the meadows becoming difficult to walk on but we can only hope that by the time this article is published, warm Spring weather will dry them out. Walkers may also have noticed that at the bottom of The Chase, we have had our own version of Niagara Falls, as water has run along the edge of the field instead of through the culvert at the bottom of Park Lane gardens which has become blocked. Plans are being made by owners of the gardens to address this problem so eventually the waterfall should disappear, and the footpath will dry out.



Alan Bennett — not the famous writer but the last Rector of Colne Engaine — died on 14th February at the age of 92. There are many in Colne Engaine, and no doubt in Earls Colne and White Colne, who remember him. He was a parish priest who put pastoral care and parish ministry at the heart of everything he did. Terry Hawthorn remembers Alan visiting just three days after Terry and his young family moved into Colne Engaine; I remember him calling in the day after I returned home from hospital with my new-born son.

Alan was the Rector of Colne Engaine from 1981-88. He didn't live in the 'Old Rectory', the large house off Boose's Green which had been sold in 1953, but in a Victorian house on the village green that became the Rectory. Soon after he moved in, Alan married his second wife, Ann, in the church here. Doreen, his first wife, had died of cancer; Ann was a close friend of the family who had helped to care for them and it had been Doreen's wish that Alan would marry Ann after her death. We extend condolences to Ann, Alan's three children, Lindsey, Kate and Nick, his grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

After Alan left Colne Engaine to take care of a multiple parish, living in Norfolk the Rectory was sold and when Stuart Holden retired as Vicar of Earls Colne the two parishes were joined together with a single Vicar. (If you're wondering about the difference between vicars and rectors it's mostly to do with how they were paid historically andCont'd /

makes no difference to their jobs now.) This brought to an end a history of Rectors of Colne Engaine that stretched back to 1219 when Peter de Feria was installed as the first Rector under the patronage of Vitalis Engaine. The advowson, or right to appoint the Rector, passed eventually to Lady Mary Ramsey, a well-known name in Halstead. She donated the manor and the advowson to Christ's Hospital, a charitable institution founded to provide education for children of the poor and now an independent school; it retains its charitable status (and distinctive uniforms!) and provides means-tested bursaries.

Alan was appointed by Christ's Hospital but came from a rather different background than its Headmasters who had traditionally been appointed as Rectors: he had been an Army chaplain, serving in Northern Ireland and Germany. He then was at the New Town parishes in Colchester, before coming to Colne Engaine. He worked alongside Stuart Holden, the Vicar of Earls Colne, helping out with holidays, and the two also worked with the Quakers and Baptists in Earls Colne, improving ecumenical relationships. He also took Methodist services in retirement.

I communicated briefly with Alan while I was writing my short history of eight hundred years of Rectors of Colne Engaine (*Colne Engaine 1219*) and he mentioned concern at the



direction the church is taking as it moves away the thousand-year-old idea of the parish with its priest at the heart of the parish towards a more managerial approach, with many diocesan officers and fewer parish priests. Alan belonged to a generation of parish priests who had more autonomy than they do now and who were able to focus on pastoral care: 'Holding the hand of the dying', as Alan expressed it. Alan saw being a vicar as his vocation and he continued to take services and celebrate communion until shortly before Christmas. Vicars now have more demands made upon them (from above and below!) and we are fortunate to be in the care and under the guidance of Mark, with Sharon and Hugh, so the work of the church in the parish can continue.

Up On The Allotment



Busy time for veggies. It's all happening on the plot now, garlic and onions are growing well, rhubarb has produced a good crop, and the raspberries are putting on good growth already, you could say everything is coming up roses, which is strange coz I never planted any. I will be sowing seed potatoes now after 'chitting' them in the greenhouse, (which is actually not green, Its transparent) anyway, I will be growing them in tubs again this season, a layer of compost on the bottom (I really should of sat on a cushion) and then space the seed taters about 6" (150mm) apart with the shoots facing upwards, before covering with a good 6" (150mm) of home grown compost. Some of the taters had shoots growing all round so I rubbed off the smallest ones, so they were all on one side. As they grow, I will put in extra layers of compost to force them to grow taller until the tubs are full, this is because the potatoes grow on the underground stems so this should encourage a larger crop. Spud grew sweet potatoes last year, and they were very successful so I will have a go this year, to be accurate they are not actually true potatoes as they are more closely related to the morning glory flower (*Ipomea*) Sweet potatoes (*Ipomea batatas*) produce edible tubers which develop underground. The leaves and shoots can also be eaten, treated the same way as you would spinach. They do like it hot and want plenty of water, they produce vines that can grow up to 5' (1500mm) tall so I will be growing them in tubs with canes supporting the vines. If the leaves look attractive, I might put the tubs on the patio, it's nice and hot there and they stand a better chance of being watered regularly.Cont'd /

Up On The Allotment



Sweet potatoes are grown from cuttings, which can be ordered online from April, they need to be grown on in the warm, indoors or in the greenhouse if you have one, if not grow them under plastic cloches until they are ready to plant out in late May/early June. They should be ready to harvest from September onwards, the longer the growing season the better.

Better make a list of jobs for the rest of April before I run out of page.


Onion sets can still go in 6" (150mm) apart and pushed into the soil with the tips showing, cover them with fleece or sticks to stop the birds pulling them out. If the ground is good, things to sow now include beetroot, parsnips, carrots, peas, lettuce, and spinach, leeks and summer cabbage can be sown as well. If you want to get things growing indoors/in the greenhouse, get going on runner beans, sweetcorn, courgettes, pumpkins, squashes, and cucumbers. Oh yeah, nearly forgot tomatoes, if you want to grow toms in a cold greenhouse they can be planted now. Prepare the ground for things like runner beans by laying a thick mulch of compost (home grown if you have it) and set up your supports in wigwams or rows - whatever floats your boat.

Well, looks like that's it, I have run out of space.

Recipe Corner

Beetroot and Celeriac Bake (Serves 2)

You can do a lot with a few vegetables and a bit of white sauce. You can ring the changes, depending on the vegetables you have, and add grated cheese – or not.

We tend to buy beetroot already boiled or – ugh!– bottled with vinegar, and eat it with salad, but fresh beetroot, boiled by you and eaten within a few days, always tastes better. And it's delicious eaten hot, as a side vegetable.

Ingredients

2 largish fresh beetroots (or several smaller ones) About 4ozs sliced celeriac Half an ounce of mixed nuts (the sort that come ready-chopped in a packet). For the Sauce: 1 oz butter 1 oz butter 1 oz plain flour Half a pint of milk 1 tablespoonful of mustard (your preferred type) Salt and pepper 2 ozs grated cheese (optional)

Method:

<u>Beetroot</u> Boil the beetroot in plenty of water in a lidded pan, making sure the water covers them.

Expect to boil larger beets for about 45 minutes, smaller ones for about 30 minutes. The only way to judge whether beets are cooked is remove them out the pan, allow them to cool for about a minute, then feel how soft they are. If they're still hard, put them back into the pan and cook longer.

When they are cooked, allow the beets to cool, then push the skin off with your fingers. (Yes, your fingers will become stained but it will be worth it.)

Roughly chop the beetroot.

<u>Celeriac</u> Cut a slice off the celeriac bulb and weigh it. (Assume the skin will weigh about 1oz, so weigh out 5ozs.) Peel the celeriac and chop it roughly. (You may do better with a sharp knife than with a potato peeler.) Boil (or microwave) the celeriac slices until just soft.

Make the Sauce: Melt butter in the pan. Stir in the flour and allow to cook. Stir in the

milk, little by little, until you have a thin sauce. Add salt, pepper and mustard. Add about half the grated cheese (if you're using cheese).

Layer the beetroot and celeriac in an oven-proof dish. Pour sauce over the vegetables. Sprinkle the nuts (and cheese, if using) over the top. Bake in the oven for 20 minutes.


